## Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease: Translating New Understanding Into Improved Patient Care

The 32nd RESPIRATORY CARE Journal Conference continues a 21-year tradition of the American Association for Respiratory Care in convening a distinguished faculty of physicians, respiratory therapists, and nurses to review important topics in respiratory care and share their experience and knowledge with respiratory therapists. These conferences are typified by a vigorous collaboration of experts who come together in a spirit of teamwork to generate a rich dialogue and the state-of-the-art reviews such as those that fill the following pages.
